Wish/ if only

Structure: Subject + wish + subject + simple past + complement.

If only + subject + simple past+ complement.

Usage: We use **wish/if only** to express how we would like a current situation to be different.

Examples:

- I **wish** that I **had** a big house (I don't have a big house, but it's a nice idea!).
- **If only** John **weren't** busy tomorrow* (he is busy, unfortunately).

Note: when we use verb to be we can use "was" or "were" with the first and third person (I, he, she, it). It is ok both of the options.




Structure: Subject + wish + subject + could + simple present + complement.

If only + subject + could + simple present + complement.

Usage: We use **wish/if only + could** to say that we'd like the ability or permission to do something.

Examples:

- I wish I could fly.
- If only I could skip work tomorrow.
